Speed Sharing Teaching Strategies and Tools

Speed Sharing with Teaching and Learning Strategies and Tools is our first activity of the year and an informal opportunity to have meaningful conversations with our colleagues about teaching and learning strategies and tools we use in the classroom. Participants will have three 9-minute "speed sharing" conversations around topics the CTL provides, ranging from technology-based learning to feedback strategies! Academic Advisor Series

Supporting Neurodiverse Learners: Case-Based Learning is a two-part workshop that will occur over two forty-five-minute sessions. This is a CTL workshop series partnered with Dakota State University Disability Services and the Counseling Center. Learners will be paired with colleagues, given a real-world scenario regarding faculty interactions with neurodiverse learners that involves solving problems and working collaboratively to decide how faculty groups would address emergent concerns. Group will discuss their strategies for tackling the problems posed, share questions or struggles they faced in making decisions, and work with campus stakeholders who support our neurodiverse learners who can provide additional support and resources. Case studies will be adapted from the College Autism Network Case Studies.

Project-Based Learning with Generative AI

Want to integrate authentic assessment into your courses but not sure where to start? Are you looking for ways to improve student agency and ownership of the learning process? Project-Based Learning with Generative AI can be an effective way to mirror professional tasks students will encounter in future teams. Structuring a learning experience around an authentic problem can also demonstrate for students how large language models are more effective at brainstorming than generating unique insights and solutions. Working in an assignment planning journal powered by H5P, participants will co-design a project-based assignment with ChatGPT, evaluate that assignment according to the High-Quality Project Based Learning Framework, and draft an AI support policy for a specific assignment.

Fostering Social Presence Online
